

## The Key to Career Guidance for Children that Parents Must Know

### The key to career development - positive self-awareness

Unlike infants who do not recognize differences, children may tease others for reasons such as skin color and appearance at elementary school. When a child is intimidated by the way people look at him or her, they may develop negative self-awareness. At this time, it is important to help your children develop positive self-awareness by explaining the importance of believing in and loving oneself.

It would be a good idea to explain how much strength they have as a global talent to understand two languages and cultures. A parent's self-esteem is the child's self-esteem. The most important thing is for parents to have such self-esteem themselves. If parents show that they perceive a multicultural environment positively and participate in it actively, children will grow up much more confident.

### Communication skills are the beginning of academic and career preparation

If your children were born overseas and immigrated to Korea, or if they have been using their parents' native language at home mostly, they may experience language barriers at school. Poor language skills in this period limit their communication, which may lead to difficulty in forming interpersonal relationships or to them quitting school. It is necessary to make efforts to solve communication problems.

The Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Gender Equality and Family offer various programs, including education and counseling, to help children from multicultural families learn Korean properly. Help your children overcome language difficulties by utilizing the national and regional services. (Danuri Helpline 1577-1366)

### Inspire interest and career curiosity

Elementary school children do not have enough information to decide their career path, so they choose their dream jobs based on ones they have heard of. During this time, the children can change greatly. It is important to expose your children to more career information rather than set a career goal. Catalin Kariko, a COVID-19 vaccine developer; Elon Musk, the founder of Tesla; Vitalik Buterin, who created the cryptocurrency Ethereum, etc. Talk about a career with your children by sharing stories of various role models who have grown up in a multicultural environment and have global influence.

Compared to non-multicultural families, multicultural families do not have easy access to career and educational information and often lack understanding of the curriculum due to cultural differences. Visit your local family center (Multicultural Family Support Center) and ask for help.

# Career Coaching Examples for Parents of Multicultural Families

'Career coaching' is the process of discovering and developing the potential hidden deep within oneself. Let's take a look at some examples of how children's abilities and strengths were developed through career coaching.

It is important to set goals and plans together with your children and put them into action for their future. Use the examples below for career coaching for your children to overcome difficulties and adapt to the situations they are in.



## Learn your parents' native language



Why should I learn Mongolian when none of my friends know it?

What can you do with Mongolian?
