

What Kinds of Career Concerns Do Our Children Have?

During middle school, children form a sense of identity through various changes in schoolwork, peer relationships, etc. What kinds of career concerns would our children have? Let's learn about children's concerns and think about how to help them.

"What can I do well?"

Multicultural children may have low self-respect due to identity crises, language difficulties, and low academic achievement. It is important for them to understand themselves and know what they want and what kind of life they want to live, but it can be difficult for them.

At this time, it is important for parents to help their children know that they are different from others and to believe in themselves. You need to help your children raise their self-efficacy by telling them 'You can do this' and recognize their personalities and values.

- Talk to your children about what they want and what kind of life they want to live.
- Take time to think about your children's aptitudes, interests, personalities, and values.
- Explain that bilingualism can be a strength and an advantage in the global era.

"Do I really have to study?"

Multicultural children, especially the ones who immigrated to Korea, are under a lot of stress in the process of adapting to a foreign language and culture. Difficulties with communicating in Korean can have a broad impact on education, career, and family relationships.

They may also have low academic achievement or a passive attitude towards class participation. At this point, parents should explain that studying will help them be better at what they want to do rather than just telling them to study.

- Set study goals and plans with your children.
- Teach them how to make vocabulary cards and memorize them, and practice with them.
- Use the institutions or after-school programs for them to learn about the fun of learning Korean.



"I have no dream!"

Multicultural children may drop out of school or feel unwilling to pursue their career or further education due to emotional confusion and difficulties that continue from an early age. This is because they may have difficulties in the adaptation process if they went to school without prior knowledge of the Korean school system, social customs, and peer culture. It is necessary for parents to provide emotional support so that their adolescent children can develop healthy self-awareness. When children say they are worried because they don't have dreams, it can be a positive sign, as it is the beginning of thinking about a career path.

- Dreams can change any time. Help your children to freely imagine the future.
- Let them know it is important to develop the ability to look at career choices through various experiences.
- Guide them to have dreams through talks about careers, job-related materials, mentoring, etc.
